

From The Pastor


Cleanse the Temple

In Judaism, the Temple was the most sacred place of encounter between God and His people. It was commonly believed that God dwelt in His Temple and could be accessed there in a singular way. And it was in the Temple where the most solemn of sacrifices were rendered, and where Jesus Himself was presented a mere 40 days after His birth (see LK 2:22).

The Gospel passage for today's Mass (JN 2:13-25) has Jesus discovering that the Temple in Jerusalem is being abused and turned into a marketplace. In response, our Lord angrily drives the moneychangers out, overturning their tables and spilling their coins onto the floor.

The anger of Jesus is understandable, for the place where He goes to meet His heavenly Father – His Father's House – has been desecrated, and He and the others who have gone to the Temple for a sacred encounter have been robbed of their rightful opportunity.

In a very real sense, the Gospel story of Jesus' cleansing of the Temple presents us with a twofold challenge. First, it forces us to reflect upon our own behavior in our parish church, where God is always present in the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Altar. Do we really have an appropriate sense of



reverence and awe whenever we enter the church for Mass or for private prayer? Is there a palpable difference between how we act inside and outside of church? Do our actions inside the church suggest that we realize we are in a sacred place of encounter between God and Man? Are we aware of and do we respect other peoples' rights to reflect, pray and worship while in church?

Secondly, we are taught from a young age that our bodies are to be considered "Temples of the Holy Spirit." Perhaps today's Gospel reading is also asking us to consider how well we treat and

respect our bodies and the bodies of others. Do we exhibit a real reverence for the body that expresses our basic beliefs that "deep within" God is present and wishes to speak with me? In what ways do we anger the Lord for defiling the "Temple of the Body" and in what ways do we need to cleanse ourselves and especially our bodies of an impurity?

During this season of Lent, may we all avail ourselves of the Sacrament of Confession, through which our bodies and souls are purified from sin and made worthy to receive the supernatural graces, gifts and blessings of Easter.



WHAT IS VESPERS?


Vespers is the liturgy of evening prayer, one of the canonical hours of the Catholic Church. The word *vesper* translates to "evening" in Latin.

Reconciliation During Lent

One of the ways to keep a holy Lent is to go to Confession so that your Easter Communion will truly be holy. Make a point to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation this month. A sincere Confession unites us with Jesus. This act of

leaving sin behind is sometimes not easy. Remorse may bring us to tears of regret when we realize the impact of our hard-hearted actions. Mercifully, forgiveness is assured. Reconciliation is achieved because the Father still welcomes home prodigal sons and daughters. If you haven't been to Confession for a while consider making it part of your seasonal preparation.

Before celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation, one should prepare oneself with an examination of conscience, which involves reflecting prayerfully on one's thoughts, words, and deeds in order to identify any sins.

There are various ways to examine your conscience but the one you use should be rooted in Scripture; particularly, the Ten Commandments and Beatitudes.



I am the Lord your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me. Have I treated people, events, or things as more important than God?

You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in

vain. Have my words, actively or passively, put down God, the Church, or people?

Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day. Do I go to Mass every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) and on Holy Days of Obligation? Do I avoid, when possible, work that impedes worship to God, joy for the Lord's Day, and proper relaxation of mind and body? Do I look for ways to spend time with family or in service on Sunday?

Honor your father and your mother. Do I show my parents due respect? Do I seek to maintain good communication with my parents where possible? Do I criticize them for lacking skills I think they should have?

You shall not kill. Have I harmed another through physical, verbal, or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind? Have I participated in an abortion, or encouraged someone to do so?

You shall not commit adultery.

Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and myself, and been faithful in marriage? **You shall not steal.** Have I taken or wasted time or resources that belonged to another?

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse. Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods. Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I compare myself to others unnecessarily?

Have I been selfish toward my parents, brothers, and sisters, teachers, or my friends and schoolmates?

Have I gotten angry at them? Have I hit anyone?

Have I held grudges or not forgiven others?

Have I performed my responsibilities, such as homework and household chores?
